

41st Annual Conference in Porto: a report



41st IATUL Annual Conference was hosted virtually during 13th-15th July at Porto, Portugal.

The conference kicked off with Professor Fernanda Rollo (NOVA Lisbon University) with the keynote calling the academic libraries as "actors and connectors" in this new age, and emphasizing the need for enhancement and extensions of our role, continuously supporting and investing in its resources and services. The first morning had the presentations of four interesting posters, and this year's Irmgard Lankenau best poster prize was awarded to "Expect the Unexpected: One Library's response to crisis and change" by Caitlin MacKenzie Mannion, Qinghua Xu, Xiaojing Zu (NYU Shanghai Library). Heather Joseph and Vanessa Proudman shared a keynote on "Libraries as Catalysts to an Open Future." Prof. Sarita Albagli, with an inspiring lecture, stressed the importance and the centrality of Open and Citizen Science should have in today's global crisis, requiring new agendas and new ways of interventions by libraries and other institutions. Prof. Teresa Leão (Faculty of Medicine, University of Porto) delivered her brilliant keynote entitled "Can libraries be a safe haven in the midst of a pandemic?". It was an inspiring and original communication, well connected to the theme, which was very enlightening for all delegates. Also, a particular reference to the Panel "Bridging to Open Research," which brought together four experienced speakers in Open Science. Maria Vicente (Plataforma de Ciência Aberta) talked about projects held in Citizen Science. Cristina Ribeiro (FEUP) spoke about her work on Open Research Data. Alastair Dunning (TU Delft) started a discussion around the new Skills for Libraries on Open Science. Finally, Kathleen Shearer (COAR) explained COAR's work and role on Open Repositories. It was the most exciting and insightful panel with a follow-up discussion on working methods and best practices.

Though we have missed a great opportunity to visit beautiful Porto and in-person meeting and networking experiences, the organizing committee, and the host have done a great job in organizing such an interactive conference using the FLOOR platform. The feedback received was very positive for the first

fully online IATUL Annual Conference. 341 registered delegates were able to interact with each other, with speakers, and also with our sponsors ExLibris, Elsevier, Springer, and IEEE. All sessions are also made available on the IATUL's YouTube channel and proceedings will be available at Purdue University Repository very soon. *IATUL community extends a big thank you to the organizing committee and the host committee led by Luís Miguel Costa, from the Faculdade de Engenharia University of Porto.*

The General Assembly was held as part of the 41st IATUL Annual Conference 2021 in Porto, as a webinar on Tuesday 13th July, 11:00-12:30 CEST via the online conference platform FLOOR. The assembly allowed the members of IATUL to get to know and review all the work done through the last year, especially in such difficult circumstances.

Call for Nominations - IATUL Board of Directors



IATUL is calling for interested and qualified candidates to serve on its Board of Directors, the executive body of IATUL responsible for leading the development of the Association, its strategic direction, and actions. IATUL is looking for nominations to represent below regions;

- The Americas (1 seat)
- Africa and Middle East (1 seat)
- Asia and the Pacific, including
- Australia and New Zealand (1 seat)

Ordinary and Associate Members may propose representatives for election. Nominations shall name the candidate and shall show evidence of the candidate's consent. Nominators must be official representatives of a member institution. The decision as to who shall be invited to join the Board will be made by the Board and presented to the General Assembly for approval at the Annual Conference, which will take place in Miami, Florida, from 12 to 16 June 2022. Members of the Board are elected for a term of three years and shall be eligible for immediate re-election to one additional term.

Candidates are expected to take an active part in the endeavors of the IATUL Board of Directors, especially by attending Board meetings and taking on responsibilities related to assigned tasks and roles on the Board. The Board meets four times a year. Board members are expected to attend in person at the Annual Conference and General Assembly.

Please submit your nomination by completing the <u>online nomination form</u>. Nominations may be submitted by the end of January 2022 and name the candidate, who must be the Library Director/University Librarian of an IATUL member library.

An IATUL Board subcommittee recommended that IATUL explore the possibility of establishing a relationship with an association management firm to handle office functions. The IATUL Board selected the Hamburg -based <u>CPO HANSER SERVICE</u>, Hanser & Co. <u>GmbH</u> following a tender process overseen by the Board's Executive Committee. IATUL has now begun transitioning office support functions to CPO HANSER SERVICE. Rita Pape at CPO HANSER SERVICE is overseeing the process in direct collaboration with the TUM Library team and IATUL Board. Metrics and Research Impact SIGMaRI updates


